Dear Chebeague Island Community,

Greetings! It has been a wonderful first half of the year at Chebeague Island School! Students and staff have been busy in their classrooms, and we've had some great opportunities to continue our learning around the island and on the mainland this fall. This newsletter will share a few of the highlights!

As we shared earlier in the year, we have welcomed some new students and families to the Chebeague Island School community this year. Our enrollment has grown to sixteen students, four of whom are students from the mainland. These students and families have been wonderful additions to the school! Based on the positive feedback from families about these sustainability efforts, we plan to grow our enrollment to approximately twenty students for the next school year with a few more mainland students. We believe this will allow us to leverage our existing capacity to provide a high quality, enriched learning environment with a variety of social and academic peers for all CIS students.

In addition to our enrollment planning for next year, we have begun the budget development process for 2025–2026. The School Committee reviewed the first draft of the budget at their February 4th meeting and will continue working on it throughout the spring. There will be a workshop with the Selectboard on April 2nd at 5:00pm at the Town Hall if you'd like to learn more! Feel free to join us there or at any of our regular meetings!








Physical Education

Maine Audubon Learning Series


